Geoff Chubb introduced Matthew, whose parents had both worked at the Rose Bay Flying Boat Base.

Matthew began with a video of a flying boat coming gracefully over the Harbour Bridge to alight (*NOT land*) at the base in 1974. We were taken back to 1938 and Rose Bay, Sydney's first international airport.

Flying boats were quite common around the world at the time. They had hulls rather than floats and could carry a bigger load. Qantas HQ was moved to Sydney from Longreach and Brisbane.

The priority load was airmail, but they could carry about 15 passengers in apparent comfort. Anyone for golf in the aisle? They were used by government, business, the military and the wealthy. How much?

Typically £200 for a 10 day trip to the UK, with superior accommodation (anyone for Raffles?) and meals included - equivalent to a current average ANNUAL salary! Three stops a day for refuelling was the norm.

Then came the war! Now they were converted into troop carriers, a means of evacuating those under threat, even having Vickers machine guns and bomb racks added. The

government bought 169, using them for night raids and for dropping mines in Hong Kong Harbour. They brought POWs back from Changi to huge receptions.

We heard more about Catalinas, Sunderlands, their maintenance and some near disasters.



Later, they became very popular for holidays and honeymoons, especially to Lord Howe Island where the tides were the determiners for landings and takeoffs. Eventually the high cost of maintenance led to their demise, with a conventional landing strip being built on Lord Howe Island.

Matthew concluded by responding to questions which informed us of accidents, boarding methods and a reference to the Spruce (really beech!) Goose.

Ray Knight eloquently thanked the speaker, pointing out how relevant his information had been for an enthusiastic audience.

Friday 8 August Wetlands at Lime Kiln Bay - Oatley Park

The walk is 7.2 km, grade 2.5, including 2.4 km of street walking from and to Oatley Station.

It winds around Lime Kiln Bay, then around the edge of and through Oatley Park.

Meet at Turrumurra Station at 8.50 am to catch the 9.04 am train to Town Hall, then the 10.01 am to Oatley, arriving at 10.29 am. Morning tea (byo) in the Oatley Station Gardens.

History. The 45 hectares of Oatley Park (dedicated in 1887) is the largest and most intact parcel of bushland in the St. George region and contains more than 300 varieties of plants.

The wetlands form an entire ecosystem where water flows downstream through a series of pollutant traps and filters.
